5	<u>Sec 26-3-21 Purpose</u> .
6	To foster the effort of neighborhood revitalization to maintain property values, safety and
7	the overall community well-being by providing a mechanism for citizens to report land that
8	is dilapidated, hazardous or dangerous, upon which discarded materials have been
9	deposited, including junk automobiles without valid up to date license plates, unsheltered
10	building materials, partially completed structures without evidence of work activity,
11	uninhabitable structures, vacant buildings, and unmaintained buildings.
12	Sec. 26-3-22 Establishment
13	There is hereby established a Citizen Neighborhood Blight Patrol.
14	Sec. 26-3-23 Administration
15	(a) The Police Department shall act as the administering agency, receive
16	reimbursement requests, and review the documentation for compliance with the
17	conditions of assistance under this article.
18	(b) The Chief of Police, in consultation with the Chief Financial Officer or the
19	Deputy Chief Financial Officer for Office of Budget, shall promulgate

1	procedural rules for the administration of this program in accordance with
2	Section 2-111 of the Charter.
3	(c) The Police Department shall receive and review each application for the
4	creation of new Citizen Neighborhood Blight Patrols with respect to
5	compatibility of patrol boundaries and any Police Department requirements;
6	The Police Department shall approve or disapprove the applications and enter
7	approved programs into the reimbursement system.
8	(d) After approving the applications for assistance, the Police Department shall
9	approve the allocation of funds among eligible patrols.
10	(e) Citizen Blight Patrols shall be established in each police precinct utilizing the
11	established precinct boundaries as the designated patrol areas.
12	(f) The Citizen Blight Patrol Program shall be administered through the Police
13	Department's Neighborhood Police Officers (NPO's) Program in conjunction
14	with the Department of Neighborhoods.
15	(g) The Police Department shall process bi-monthly reports of expenditures from
16	eligible patrols and expedite reimbursement for all eligible expenditures
17	supported by proper receipts or other appropriate documentation up to the
18	amount of each patrol's approved budget balanced.
19	Sec. 26-3-24 Reporting.
20	(a) Citizen Blight Patrols shall conduct area assessments on a regular basis to be

1	determined by the Police Precinct Command, not to exceed once every two weeks.
2	(b) Citizen Blight Patrols shall record all potential blight violations in the designated area
3	and report such violations to the police precinct Command Officer in charge of
4	Neighborhood Policing to be forwarded to the Department of Neighborhoods for
5	follow up and resolution by the appropriate city department.
6	(c) The Department of Neighborhoods shall keep a monthly record of all reported
7	violations, including the date the report was received, nature of the complaint, city
8	department responsible for investigation, action taken by the city department and status.
9	(d) All reports generated pursuant to section 26-3-24 (b) shall be made available to the
10	general public through the department of neighborhoods, upon request.
11	Sec. 26-3-25 Form of Assistance.
12	(a) Assistance shall be provided under this article in the form of a limited account whereby

20 <u>Sec. 26-3-26 Eligible Expenditures.</u>

1	(1) Patrol members shall be eligible for mileage reimbursement, whose rate shall not
2	exceed the standard mileage rate as prescribed each yar in the Internal Revenue code,
3	being 26 USC 1 et seq., which is not subject to income tax;
4	Sec 26-3-27 Patrol Membership Qualifications.
5	(1) At least 80 percent of active patrol members shall be persons residing in or owning
6	businesses in the regularly patrolled community.
7	(2) Patrols shall not discriminate on the basis of race, religious beliefs, color, sex,
8	national origin age, height, weight, familial status marital status, disability, public
9	benefit status, sexual orientation, or gender identity or expression in selecting
10	members.
11	(3) Patrols shall not use property ownership or its equivalent as a condition of
12	membership.
13	(4) <u>A patrol may establish a minimum age of 18 years for patrol membership eligibility.</u>
14	Members under 18 years of age must be accompanied by a parent or guardian when
15	on patrol duty.
16	Secs, 26-3-28 Patrol Conduct Rules
17	(a) <u>Use of vehicles.</u>
18	(1) Use of vehicles in patrolling shall not be a condition of assistance;
19	(2) <u>Vehicles used for patrolling shall be in good mechanical condition; and</u>

1		(3) <u>Vehicles used in patrolling shall be insured in accordance with state law.</u>
2	(b)	Financial Limitations.
3		(1) <u>No salary shall be paid to any volunteer.</u>
4	(c)	All persons conducting blight patrol shall comply with the following:
5	(1)	No patrol member, including those holding concealed weapon permits, shall carry
6		any weapons on their person or in a patrol vehicle, including in the luggage
7		compartment, or vehicle trunk during patrol operations. Prohibited weapons shall
8		include, but not be limited to, guns of any type, knives, chains, clubs, tire irons
9		and chemical dispensers, but shall not include a properly stowed standard jack
10		handle, or, if participating in a recreation league, a baseball bat.
11	(2)	Dogs shall not be carried in any patrol vehicle during patrol operations.
12	(3)	During vehicle patrol operations, patrol members shall remain in their vehicles,
13		except where exit from the vehicle is necessary to obtain photos of perceived
14		blight. Any pictures obtained shall be taken from the public right of way and
15		patrol members are prohibited from entering upon private property to obtain
16		photos or other evidence of blight.
17	(4)	While on patrol, members shall not conduct interrogations of persons suspected
18		of blight activity.

1	(5)	No emergency signaling lights or other signaling devices, for example, amber
2		flashing lights or sirens, may be in operation in or on a moving patrol vehicle
3		during patrol operations. This prohibition shall not include the standard factory
4		installed flasher system or its equivalent.
5	(6)	Patrol members shall not consume or be under the influence of marijuana, other
6		illegal drugs, alcoholic liquor, or medications that induce intoxicating effects
7		while on patrol duty.

8	Sectio	n 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are
9	repeal	ed.
10	Sectio	n 3. This ordinance is declared necessary for the preservation of the public
11	peace,	health, safety, and welfare of the people of the City of Detroit.
12	Sectio	n 4. If this ordinance is passed by a two-thirds (2/3) majority of City Council
13	memb	ers serving, it shall be given immediate effect and shall become effective upon
14	public	ation in accordance with Section 4-118 of the 2012 Detroit City Charter; if passed
15	by less	s than a two-thirds (2/3) majority of City Council members serving, it shall become
16	effecti	we no later than thirty (30) days after publication in accordance with Section 4-118
17	of the 2012 Detroit City Charter; if this ordinance specifies a certain date to become	
18	effecti	ve, it shall become effective in accordance with the date
