

EGLE and the NAC to allow the NAC an opportunity to hear directly from EGLE and voice their concerns.

In February of 2022, CRIO identified and produced public notice of the air quality concerns by residents. As a result, appropriate measures are being taken by FCA/Stellantis and EGLE to remedy this concern. There has been an increase in communication with the City EGLE, and the EPA and we continue to encourage community meetings to relay updates to residents.

According to EGLE, please see the latest update provided by EGLE:

EGLE is taking escalated enforcement against Stellantis for multiple violations at their Mack Plant. This action includes violations that happened between September 2021 and May 2022. Several of the violations were the result of investigations that stemmed from community complaints of offensive odors. The escalated enforcement action resulted in a proposed legal agreement, called a consent order, which includes a monetary fine, a compliance plan, and fines if additional similar future violations are found.

The proposed consent order also includes two Supplemental Environmental Projects (SEPs). The two SEPs include a new Building Management System to greatly improve energy efficiency at Southeastern High School and partnering with The Greening of Detroit to plant over 80 trees in Brewer Park near the plant.

EGLE is seeking public input on the proposed consent order. This meeting is not the only way to tell EGLE what you think. Comments can be submitted at any time during the comment period ending on November 2, 2022.

The Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy (EGLE) hosted an online information session and public meeting on October 19, 2022 to talk with the public about the air quality enforcement action, proposed consent order, and to take comments on these for the Stellantis - Detroit Assembly Complex Mack in Detroit, Michigan.

CRIO is currently awaiting the final results of EGLE's enforcement actions and will proceed accordingly.

The previously identified non-conformance was due to Safety Alert working solely off of 1-800 sticker numbering information reported and not 'key-words' that would identify Stellantis issues when the sticker information was not available. Safety Alert has been provided a list of 'key words' to identify Stellantis issues and is fully operating under both sicker information and 'key-word' information to report issues to Stellantis.

Early in 2021 CRIO learned that the toll free number was not effective. Following discussion, Stellantis took action to address the issues. Their efforts are detailed below.

Safety Alert Service Gaps - 1800 Report 9 (1800 737 6789)

- The investigation into service accuracy uncovered some significant gaps in connecting potential complaints to Stellantis management
- Test calls were performed at 5PM and 7PM EST on March 16th, 2021, where Stellantis was not recognized by the operator
